


Figure 6.1. Prevalence of obesity among adults aged 20 years and over: United States, 1997–March 2011





- In early 2011, 29.5% (95% confidence interval = 28.14%–30.85%) of U.S. adults aged 20 and over were obese, which was higher than, but not significantly different from the 2010 estimate of 28.4%.
- The prevalence of obesity among U.S. adults aged 20 and over has increased over time, from 19.4% in 1997 to 29.5% in early 2011.

NOTES: Data are based on household interviews of a sample of the civilian noninstitutionalized population. • Obesity is defined as a body mass index (BMI) of 30 kg/m² or more. The measure is based on self-reported height (m) and weight (kg). • Estimates of obesity are restricted to adults aged 20 and over for consistency with the *Healthy People 2010* (3) program. • The analyses excluded people with unknown height or weight (about 6% of respondents each year). • See "<u>Technical Notes</u>" for more details.



Figure 6.2. Prevalence of obesity among adults aged 20 years and over, by age group and sex: United States, January–March 2011





- For both sexes combined, the prevalence of obesity was higher among adults aged 40–59 (32.4%) than among adults aged 20–39 (28.0%) and those aged 60 and over (27.5%). This pattern was also seen in women.
- For adults aged 20–39, 40–59, and 60 and over, there was no significant difference between women and men in the prevalence of obesity.

- Non-Hispanic black women were more likely than Hispanic women and non-Hispanic white women to be obese.
- Non-Hispanic black men were more likely than Hispanic men and non-Hispanic white men to be obese.
